I praise and thank the Lord our God for the many graces He has given me all these years. I praise and thank Him for the mission and path that He has led me to undertake from the time I become Vice Mayor of Quezon City up to being an elected Senator of the Republic. Our Senate as the other half of the Congress of the Philippines began to exist in 1916, such that not many years ago we celebrated our centenary. By the way, there is only one family name that existed in the 1916 Senate and the 2016 Senate: Sotto, my grand uncle Filemon Sotto in 1916 and yours truly, Vicente Sotto, in 2016. The first Senate President was the late great President of the Commonwealth Manuel Luis Quezon who so dominated the political era and is today remembered as a province and a city that his memory never fades from our people’s consciousness. He was followed by more than 20 others whose names evoke memories of political astuteness, brilliance of mind and urbanity of behavior. I do not claim nor aspire for the same accolades. It is enough for me to have been your friend these many years, a builder of consensus if arguments stand in the way, a harmonizer should there be discordant notes. I had the rare chance of having been mentored by the Senate Presidents who served before me.

On the aspect of LAWMAKING, to be precise, we have passed laws that offered relief to ease the effects of COVID-19 on Filipinos.

Throughout the critical days of graded lockdown, your Senate was able to enact the annual budget on time.

During this pandemic, hospital occupancy literally spilled onto driveways and parking lots. It seemed like the dark hours would never end.

Fortunately, we are mostly over that hump. Thanks to the government’s vigorous vaccination campaign as mandated by the COVID-19 Vaccination Program Act of 2021.

Our public health recovery can also be traced to the heroic efforts of all medical frontliners. They stayed the course despite the apparent danger to their health.

We are also thankful for the cooperation of the enlightened citizenry. Despite experiencing initial difficulties, they trusted their government. More so, they complied as best as they can with quarantine and medical protocols.

On the matter of LEAVING, we Filipinos turn sentimental. Rizal wrote a long poem as he contemplated his execution. Our OFWs have tear jerking scenes that rival movies in heart-rending last-minute tears and hugs.

We here are less prone to these expressions, but the sweet-sorrow of parting is real. We have come to love the Senate, its members, the secretariat, and the plain serenity of being at its premises. It will always have a special place in my heart.

Our dear Filipinos, it is with fervent hope that the laws passed under this 18th Congress will make a difference in the lives of our fellow Filipinos.

As the 18th Congress comes to a close, so shall my term as Senator.

I look back on that day in 1992 when I was first elected into office. I remember entering the old Senate building, which is now a national museum, as a neophyte senator.

I have been in public service for decades already. My journey has been long and arduous, but it had its shining moments. My years at the Senate — as Senate President and as a regular senator—are the highlights of my career as a public servant. I can and I will show off my legislative accomplishments not only to my grandkids but to the younger generations, proud and guilt-free that I have not abused my position to enrich myself or any member of my family. I have kept my credibility intact and my name unsullied.

In my years in the Senate, I had the good fortune of learning from the best minds in the country. In turn, I earned the respect of my colleagues. And I became—as you may recall—the minority leader and majority leader.

I am also indebted to each one of the officers and employees of the Senate Secretariat, headed by Atty. Myra Marie Villarica, who made sure that the legislative wheel kept turning.

To the journalists covering the Senate, I give you my thanks. As members of the press, you have a vital role in maintaining transparency and accountability in government. As our bridge to and from the public, your work is always appreciated.

I am and will always be grateful to the millions of Filipinos who have given me their trust and confidence. *Salamat sa tiwala at kumpiyansa.*

Today, as I stand before my colleagues and the Filipino people on my last day as Senate President, I have one final and earnest appeal to the incoming 19th Congress: Maintain the integrity and independence of the Senate. *Huwag ninyong payagan na mabahiran ng politika ang inyong serbisyo sa taumbayan. Ingatan ninyo ang respetong ibinigay ng bawat Pilipino sa Senado at sa mga miyembro nito.*

When the time comes that my humble name will have to be ensconced and chiseled into the annals of the Senate's history, I want to be remembered best as Vicente C. Sotto III, a musician by profession, a sportsman by affiliation, a drug-buster by vocation, and a public servant by conviction.

SURVEY OF SENATE ACCOMPLISHMENTS

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AGRICULTURE

R.A. No. 11598 – An Act Authorizing the Department of Agriculture to Provide for Direct Cash Assistance to Farmers Who are Tilling Two (2) Hectares and Below of Rice Land Until 2024, and Use for the Purpose the Annual Tariff Revenues in Excess of Ten Billion Pesos (P10B) of the Rice Competitiveness Enhancement Fund Created Under Republic Act No. 11203, Entitled “An Act Liberalizing the Importation, Exportation and Trading of Rice, Lifting for the Purpose the Quantitative Import Restriction on Rice, and for Other Purposes” (S. No. 1927/H. No. 9950)
[December 10, 2021]

This is the Cash Assistance for Filipino Farmers Act. It mandates the fund transfer of rice farmers’ financial assistance to farmers tilling two (2) hectares and below of rice land until 2024.

The fund shall be sourced from the excess rice tariff collection under the Rice Competitiveness Enhancement Fund (RCEF). The cash assistance is in light of the current state of declining *palay* prices and the crippling effects of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Department of Agriculture is authorized to use the funds from the annual tariff revenues in excess of the P10 billion of the rice competitiveness enhancement fund created under RA 11203, entitled: “An Act Liberalizing the Importation, Exportation and Trading of Rice, Lifting for the Purpose the Quantitative Import Restriction on Rice, and for Other Purposes”. The Bureau of Customs is also mandated to directly remit to the DA the said excess funds.

R.A. No. 11700 – An Act Declaring the Province of Catanduanes as the Abaca Capital of the Philippines (S. No. 1978/H. No. 6149) [Lapsed into Law On April 15, 2022 without the signature of the President, in accordance with Article VI, Section 27 (1) of the Constitution.]

This law declares the province of Catanduanes as the Abaca Capital of the Philippines. Catanduanes is the country’s biggest producer of abaca, making the Philippines world-renowned as “Manila Hemp” in the fiber industry. Abaca as a raw material has the potential to increase the country’s export earnings. Moreover, it provides livelihood to many small farmers in the countryside.

R.A. No. 11707 – An Act Declaring the Municipality of San Jose in the Province of Batangas, as the “Egg Basket of the Philippines” (S. No. 2044/H. No. 7660) [April 17, 2022]

In recognition of the economic significance of its egg industry in both local and national levels, the law declares the San Jose, Batangas as the “Egg Basket of the Philippines.”

S. No. 2494 – An Act Strengthening the Financing System for Agriculture, Fisheries, and Rural Development in the Philippines, Repealing for the Purpose Republic Act No. 10000 or the Agri-Agra Reform Credit Act Of 2009

The bill seeks to promote rural development to enhance access of rural communities, and agricultural and fisheries households to financial services and programs.

Agriculture, fisheries and rural development financing shall consist of loans and investments to finance activities that enhance productivity, and increase income of an agricultural and fisheries household.

Both the Landbank of the Philippines (LBP) and the Development Bank of the Philippines (DBP) shall continue to promote affordable deposit products such as the basic deposit account for deposits and low interest rates for loans. Likewise, the lending cooperatives, microfinance institutions, retail banks, rural and thrift banks shall apply minimum interest rates for wholesale loans obtained from government banks.

The bill also proposes that there shall be an agriculture, fisheries and rural development financing system. The said financing system shall consist of loans and investments to finance activities that shall improve the productivity, income, competitiveness and welfare of the rural community beneficiaries through government and private banks.

Among the rural folks beneficiaries are the farmers, fisherfolk, agrarian reform beneficiaries (ARBs), agrarian reform

communities (ARCs), settlers, agricultural lessees, amortizing owners, farmworkers, fish workers, owner-cultivators, compact farmers, tenant farmers, members of their household and their micro, small and medium enterprises (MSMEs), as well as farmer's and fisherfolk's cooperatives, organizations and associations.

The proposed bill should have been in effect for 10 years from approval.

APPROPRIATIONS

R.A. No. 11639 – An Act Appropriating Funds for the Operation of the Government of the Republic of the Philippines from January One to December Thirty-One, Two Thousand and Twenty-Two (H. No. 10153) [December 30, 3031]

This law provides a national budget in the amount of P5.024 trillion for fiscal year 2022. The budget's focus is on building resilience amid the pandemic, sustaining recovery, and infrastructure development.

By class of expenditure, maintenance and other operating expenditures (MOOE) was granted P2.599 trillion or 51.7% of the national budget. Personnel Services (PS) received an allotment of P1.405 trillion or 28% of the total 2022 budget. Capital Outlay (CO) garnered P1.019 trillion or 20.3% of the General Appropriations Act.

Banner programs of the government are in the areas of health, labor, social welfare and infrastructure—all in response to the pandemic and building resiliency, while keeping track of its commitment to sustainable development. Along this context, budgetary support was granted to the National Health Insurance Program in the amount of P80 billion. This will be used to subsidize

the health insurance programs of 13.2 million indigent families and 7.3 million senior citizens. Moreover, the Health Facilities Enhancement Program was given P23 billion to construct, upgrade, expand, and procure equipment for health facilities and hospitals. The procurement of drugs, medicines, and vaccines was pegged at P32.6 million and the Human Resources for Health Deployment Program was allotted P17 billion to fund the salaries and benefits of public health personnel. In anticipation of the emergence of new and the re-emergence of old viruses, P983 million was granted for the establishment of the Virology Science and Technology Institute to study and address said viruses. This shall be complemented with the grant of P200 million to the Philippine Genomic Information Resource Hub to sustain its bio-surveillance efforts.

The Act also allotted P51 billion for the Special Risk Allowance of health workers composed of P9 billion lodged with the DOH, while P42.0 billion was reserved and can be tapped through Unprogrammed Appropriations. Moreover, P48.2 billion is allocated for the purchase of COVID-19 booster shots, also allotted under DOH's budget as well as the Unprogrammed Appropriations.

The labor sector also received "*ayuda*" for displaced workers affected by COVID-19 lockdowns. The amount of P26.5 billion was granted under the Tulong Panghanapbuhay sa Ating Disadvantaged/Displaced Workers (TUPAD) Program.

Social Protection programs under DSWD were also funded like the continuation of the Pantawid Pamilyang Pilipino Program (4Ps) and the Sustainable Livelihood Program.

R.A. No. 11640 – An Act Extending the Availability of the 2021 Appropriations to December 31, 2022, Amending for the Purpose Section 62 of the General Provisions of Republic Act No. 11518, the General Appropriations Act of Fiscal Year 2021 (H. No. 10373) [December 30, 2021]

This Act extends the availability of appropriations authorized under Republic Act No. 11518.

Until December 31, 2022, authorized appropriations like the budgetary support to GOCCs and financial assistance to LGUs shall be available for release and obligation. Likewise, inspection and payment for construction of infrastructure projects, delivery of goods and services, shall only be until December 31, 2022. Funds, however, for personnel services shall be released, obligated and disbursed only until December 31, 2021.

After the abovementioned deadlines, all unexpended and undisbursed funds shall be reverted to the unappropriated surplus of the General Fund and shall not be spent unless there is a law enabling such action. The same goes for all unused funds which may be obligated but not disbursed.

The law thus state that statutory shares of LGUs shall be released, obligated and disbursed until appropriations are fully utilized and funds fully disbursed. Transfers between LGUs are exempted from said deadlines.

A report on these obligations, releases and disbursements shall be submitted to the House of Representatives and the Senate.

BANKING AND FINANCIAL REFORM

R.A. No. 11597 – An Act Providing for the Revised Charter of the Philippine Veterans Bank, Repealing for the Purpose

Republic Act No. 3518, as Amended, Otherwise Known as “An Act Creating the Philippine Veterans Bank, and for Other Purposes” (S. No. 2368/H. No. 8164) [December 10, 2021]

This Act revitalizes the Philippine Veterans Bank (PVB) by increasing its capital stock, expanding its investor-beneficiary base by qualifying post-World War II (WWII) veterans, strengthening its organizational structure, and establishing it as a government depository while maintaining its status as a private commercial bank.

This measure provides PVB with corporate powers and functions. Further, it provides PVB with a capital stock of P10 billion to be divided into 75 million common shares and 25 million preferred shares with a par value of P100.00 each. The Board of Directors of PVB shall be empowered to increase the authorized capital stock and provide features of preferred shares subject to pertinent laws, the rules and regulations of the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas (BSP), and the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC).

This law provides that PVB shall be a government depository and a private commercial bank. All branches of government—both national and local, government-owned and controlled corporations, are authorized to make and maintain deposits with the PVB, should they opt to do so. Concurrently, PVB shall be deemed registered and duly authorized to do business and operate as a private commercial bank.

This law sets a prohibition on the use of the word “veterans” in all other banks except the PVB, including those banks currently using said term in their names or titles. Violators shall be fined in the amount of not less than P10,000.00 for each day of violation. Penalty shall be enforced by the PVB.

Officials, employees and agents of PVB and other persons who violate or permit the violation of any provision in this measure shall be fined in the amount of not more than one P100,000.00 or imprisonment of not more than five (5) years or both.

R.A. No. 11696 – An Act Providing Compensation for the Loss or Destruction of Properties and Loss of Lives as a Result of the 2017 Marawi Siege, and Appropriating Funds Therefor (S. No. 2420/H. No. 9925) [April 13, 2022]

This law provides the basis of compensating the heirs of people who died or whose properties were lost or destroyed during the 2017 Marawi Siege. It establishes the Marawi Compensation Board (MCB), an independent and quasi-judicial body that shall formulate a system of determining and indemnifying the local population for loss of lives and property brought about by the siege.

The MCB shall be composed of nine (9) members: three (3) of whom shall be lawyers and preferably from the Maranao ethnic group and who have been practicing law for at least five (5) years; one (1) licensed physician; one (1) certified public accountant; one (1) educator; one (1) licensed engineer; and two (2) representatives of civil society organizations, at least one of whom is either a Sharia lawyer or a Muslim traditional leader.

The President shall appoint the chairperson of MCB as well as the other members. However, organizations of traditional leaders, professionals, the Ulama and civil society organizations may submit nominations to the President.

The Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) of this law shall be formulated by MCB in consultation with the Department of Finance, Department of Budget and Management, Bangsamoro Human Rights Commission, Task Force Bangon Marawi, and the National Economic and Development Authority.

A sunset clause is also provided, citing that MCB shall complete its work within five (5) years from effectivity of the IRR. After which MCB shall cease to exist.

R.A. No. 11712 – An Act Granting Mandatory Continuing Benefits and Allowances to Public and Private Health Care Workers During the Covid-19 Pandemic and Other Future Public Health Emergencies, and Appropriating Funds Therefor (S. No. 2421/10701) [April 27, 2022]

The grant of allowances and benefits to healthcare workers during the COVID-19 pandemic and other future public health emergencies are institutionalized under this law.

These allowances and benefits shall be given to all healthcare and non-healthcare workers—both public and private—who are in the medical, allied medical, administrative, technical, support, and other necessary personnel employed by or assigned in hospitals, health facilities, monitoring facilities, vaccination sites and other facilities involved in the treatment and management of public health emergencies. These allowances and benefits shall be granted to said personnel regardless of their employment status.

Given the risks faced by health workers in the context of their work assignment, the grant of a monthly Health Emergency Allowance (HEA) shall be as follows: Those deployed in the low-risk areas shall receive P3,000.00; in medium-risk areas, P6,000.00; in high-risk areas, P9,000.00. Upon the approval of the president, the HEA may be increased in consideration of the costs incurred by the concerned workers in rendering their services during a public health emergency. This particular allowance is to be given on top of the benefits granted to health workers under Republic Act No. 7305 or the “Magna Carta of Public Health Workers”, and other forms of hazard pay as a result of collective bargaining agreements with private employers.

When infected by COVID-19 in the line of duty, the health workers shall be provided with the following: (1) In case of death of the health worker, the heirs shall receive P1 million; (2) In severe or critical case, the individual shall be given P100,000.00; and (3) In mild or moderate sickness, the individual shall receive P15,000.00).

This law shall not diminish the benefits under the Magna Carta for Public Health Workers and other existing laws, decrees, issuances, executive orders, and contracts or agreements between health care and non-health care workers and their employers.

R.A. No. 11765 – An Act Affording More Protection to Consumers of Financial Products and Services (S. No. 2488/H. No. 6768) [May 6, 2022]

This law provides a framework for government regulators to safeguard the interest of financial consumers. It lays down the mechanism by which these regulators can implement transparency and fairness in a market where both financial providers and consumers can thrive. In this context, confidence in the country’s financial market shall be strengthened and thus contribute to the realization of a stable financial system.

This Act refers to the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas (BSP), Insurance Commission (IC), Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC), and Cooperative Development Authority (CDA) as the regulators. Financial consumers are persons and entities who purchase, lease, receive or are prospecting these actions pertaining to any financial product like savings, deposits, insurance, securities, investments, remittances, pre-need, and health maintenance organization (HMO), among others. Financial service providers are persons or entities, both natural and juridical, who sell these products. Under this law, investment advisers are regarded as financial service providers.

Specifically, this law prescribes that regulators implement measures that shall ensure the following financial consumer rights: 1) Right to equitable and fair treatment; 2) Right to disclosure and transparency of financial products and services; 3) Right to protection of consumer assets against fraud and misuse; 4) Right to data privacy and protection; and 5) Right to timely handling and redress of complaints. The regulators are also granted the following powers to ensure protection of abovementioned rights: 1) Rulemaking; 2) Market surveillance and examination; 3) Enforcement; and 5) Consumer redress or handling of complaints.

S. No. 2365 – An Act Amending Sections 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 13, 18, 22, 24, 26, and 28 of Republic Act No. 3591, as Amended, Otherwise Known as the Philippine Deposit Insurance Corporation Charter, and for Other Purposes

This bill amends RA. No. 3591 or the Philippine Deposit Insurance Corporation (PDIC) Charter, by attaching and placing the PDIC under the supervision of the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas (BSP). Moreover, it recognizes Islamic Banking by including “*takaful*” into the banking system.

A Board of Directors (BOD) is provided under the law which shall be composed of seven members with the Governor of the BSP as ex-officio chairperson and the Secretary of Finance as ex-officio vice-chairperson; the President of the PDIC who shall be appointed by the President of the Philippines from among a shortlist prepared by the Governance Commission for Government-Owned or Controlled Corporations (GOCC), and four other members who shall be appointed by the President of the Philippines from the private sector.

The BOD shall be authorized to establish separate insurance funds, insurance arrangements or structures or *takaful*, taking into consideration the peculiar characteristics of Islamic banking. This authority of the BOD also includes increasing the

insurance coverage, establishing the eligibility of institutions, assessing the premium rate, and formulating implementing rules and regulations. In relation, *takaful* shall be defined as mutual guarantee in return for the commitment to donate an amount in the form of a specified contribution to the covered entities' risk fund, in which the covered entities agree among themselves to support one another jointly for the losses arising from specified risks. By recognizing the peculiar characteristics of Islamic banking, certain products or arrangements shall be deemed as deposit per BSP. Along this view, PDIC shall formulate rules and regulations for the extension of financial assistance under Section 22 of this measure.

PDIC shall be authorized to lend assistance to distressed institutions by extending loans to, or purchase assets, assume liabilities, or make deposits to the following: (1) a bank in danger of closing, upon its acquisition by a qualified investor; (2) a qualified investor, upon its purchase of all assets and assumption of all liabilities of a bank in danger of closing; or (3) a surviving or distressed institution that has merged or consolidated with a bank in danger of closing, provided that the BOD prescribes that such acquisition, purchase of assets, assumption of liabilities, merger or consolidation, is essential to provide adequate banking service to the community or maintain financial stability in the economy.

The PDIC, as a corporate body, shall have the power to appoint its officers and employees through its BOD. Further, this measure equips PDIC to wield stricter supervision over the insured banks and depository institutions. This is in the form of the power to examine deposit records, other records and books of accounts, require information and reports, join BSP in the conduct of examination of a bank. In turn, BSP shall have access to PDIC's bank examination report, thus enabling these two institutions to share such information and results of bank examination.

CITIZENSHIP

R.A. No. 11660 – An Act Granting Philippine Citizenship to Elizabeth Eder Zobel de Ayala (H. No. 9376) [March 24, 2022]

The law grants Philippine citizenship to Mrs. Elizabeth Eder Zobel de Ayala with all the rights, privileges, and prerogatives, as well as the duties and obligations required of a citizen under the Constitution and the laws of the Republic of the Philippines.

R.A. No. 11672 – An Act Granting Philippine Citizenship to Zibin Liang (H. No. 10281) [April 6, 2022]

The law grants Philippine citizenship to Mr. Zibin Liang with all the rights, privileges and prerogatives, as well as the duties and obligations required of a citizen under the Constitution and the laws of the Republic of the Philippines.

R.A. No. 11732 – An Act Granting Philippine Citizenship to Feng Li (H. No. 9307) [April 29, 2022]

The law grants Philippine citizenship to Mr. Feng Li with all the rights, privileges and prerogatives, as well as the duties and obligations required of a citizen under the Constitution and the laws of the Republic of the Philippines.

R.A. No. 11733 – An Act Granting Philippine Citizenship to Patrick Francois Renucci (H. No. 7724) [April 29, 2022]

The law grants Philippine citizenship to Mr. Patrick Francois Renucci with all the rights, privileges and prerogatives, as well as the duties and obligations required of a citizen under the Constitution and the laws of the Republic of the Philippines.

H. No. 9308 – An Act Granting Philippine Citizenship to Linlin Guo

The bill seeks to grant Philippine citizenship to Linlin Guo with all the rights and privileges, as well as the duties and obligations required of a citizen under the Constitution and the laws of the Republic of the Philippines.

H. No. 10001 – An Act Granting Philippine Citizenship to Kwok Yam Ian Chan

The bill seeks to grant Philippine citizenship to Kwok Yam Ian Chan with all the rights and privileges, as well as the duties and obligations required of a citizen under the Constitution and the laws of the Republic of the Philippines.

**CIVIL SERVICE, GOVERNMENT
REORGANIZATION
AND PROFESSIONAL REGULATION**

R.A. No. 11701 – An Act Granting Night Shift Differential Pay to Government Employees Including those in Government-Owned or-Controlled Corporations and Appropriating Funds Therefor (S. No. 643/ H. No. 9458) [April 13, 2022]

This law grants a night shift differential pay to government employees who work between 6 p.m. and 6 a.m. Also entitled to a night shift differential pay are those in government-owned-or-controlled corporations regardless of employment status. In particular, the law covers government employees occupying position items from Division Chief and below, or their equivalent.

The night shift differential shall be at a rate not exceeding 20% of the hourly basic rate for each hour of work performed

between the covered hours. It will be in addition to and will not in any way diminish, whatever benefits and allowances are currently enjoyed by government employees.

The following government employees, however, are not covered: 1) Government employees whose schedule of office hours fall between 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. Services rendered beyond the regular eight-hour work schedules are paid overtime pay in accordance with existing laws; and 2) Government employees whose services are required, or are on call, 24 hours a day such as uniformed personnel of the Armed Forces of the Philippines, the Philippine National Police, the Bureau of Jail Management and Penology, the Bureau of Fire Protection, and other similarly situated, as may be determined by the Civil Service Commission and the Department of Budget and Management.

S. No. 1092 – An Act Institutionalizing the Grant of a Teaching Supplies Allowance for Public School Teachers and Appropriating Funds Therefor

The bill seeks to provide a tax-exempt teaching supplies allowance for teaching supplies and materials, tangible or intangible for the implementation or conduct of various learning delivery modalities (LDMS).

The provision shall be as follows:

1. P5,000.00 per teacher for the school year 2021-2022 and 2022-2023;
2. P7,500.00 per teacher; for the school year 2023-2024; and
3. P10,000.00 per teacher for the school year 2024-2025.

The grant of the cash allowance shall cover teachers who are engaged in teaching public basic education, consistent with the learning modalities recognized by the Department of Education (DepEd).

S. No. 2450 – An Act Providing for the Permanent Validity of the Certificates of Live Birth, Death, and Marriage Issued, Signed, Certified, or Authenticated by the Philippine Statistics Authority (PSA) and its Predecessor, the National Statistics Office (NSO) and the Local Civil Registries, and the Reports of Birth, Death, and Marriage Registered and Issued by the Philippine Foreign Service Posts

The bill provides for permanent validity of the certificates of live birth, death and marriage issued, signed, certified, or authenticated by the PSA, its predecessor, the NSO, and the local civil registries. The document shall be recognized and accepted provided that it is intact, readable, and still visibly contains the authenticity and security features.

On the issuance of civil registry documents and reports of Philippine Foreign Service Posts, any person whose information is registered in the civil registry, or the person's authorized representative shall not be prevented from securing a copy of civil registry documents in such number of prints or as often as necessary subject to applicable fees. On the other hand, the initial issuance of a certificate, request for replacement due to loss or damage, and reissuance upon presentation of a Certificate of Indigency from the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) shall be free of charge. This provision likewise applies to requests for the issuance of reports of birth, death, and marriage by the Philippine Foreign Service Posts.

The bill also proposes to establish a Civil Registry Database and a virtual viewing facility. The civil registry database and virtual viewing facility shall verify the authenticity of the

certificates of live birth, death, or marriage, and the reports of birth, death, or marriage, respectively.

S. No. 2484 – An Act Converting the Provincial Science and Technology Center into the Provincial Science and Technology Office in Every Province and Appropriating Funds Therefor

The bill proposes to convert the Provincial Science and Technology Centers (PSTCs) of the Department of Science and Technology (DOST) into Provincial Science and Technology Offices (PSTOs).

Reclassified under the proposal is the position of Senior Science Research Specialist, who acts as the head of the PSTO, into Chief Science Research Specialist. The compensation is also upgraded from Salary Grade 19 to Salary Grade 24.

Under the bill, the DOST Secretary shall determine the organizational structure and staffing pattern of the PSTO, subject to the review and approval of the Department of Budget and Management.

PSTO's functions would include: identifying the need and opportunities and technology in the provinces; implement DOST programs and projects on technology promotion and transfer; S&T human resource development, S&T promotion and information dissemination, and delivery of technical and consultancy services; and the development of institutional linkages with provincial offices of other departments, local government units, academe and non-government offices for the effective implementation of S&T programs in the provinces, and perform other functions as may be determined by the DOST Secretary or the regional director.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS AND REVISION OF CODES

S. No. 1530 – An Act Amending Section 18, Book VII, Chapter 3 of the Administrative Code of the Philippines

The bill seeks to amend Section 18, Book VII, Chapter 3 of Executive Order No. 292 by providing that where the administrative or legislative franchisee has filed a timely and sufficient application for the renewal of a license or franchise, the existing license or franchise shall not expire until the application shall have been finally determined by the agency, department, or branch of government authorized to grant license or franchise. There is final determination when an applicant is given written notice of approval or denial of its application for renewal.

In action on a pending application shall not be considered a denial, provided that an application for renewal of a legislative franchise is ipso facto denied when Congress adjourns sine die without approving the application.

ECONOMY

R.A. No. 11647 – An Act Promoting Foreign Investments, Amending thereby Republic Act No. 7042, Otherwise Known as the “Foreign Investments Act of 1991,” as Amended, and for Other Purposes (S. No. 1156/H. No. 300) [March 2, 2022]

The law aims to attract, promote and welcome productive foreign investments in activities that significantly contribute to sustainable, inclusive, resilient, and innovative economic growth, productivity, global competitiveness, employment creation, technological advancement, and countrywide development.

An Inter-Agency Investment Promotion Coordination Committee (IIPC) is created under the law, with the purpose of integrating all promotion and facilitation efforts to encourage foreign investments in the country. The IIPC is mandated to formulate a comprehensive and strategic Foreign Investment Promotion and Marketing Plan (FIPMP) and shall be headed by the Secretary of the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI).

A non-Philippine national, not otherwise disqualified by law may, without the need of prior approval, do business or invest in a domestic enterprise up to 100% of its capital, unless their participation is otherwise limited by the Foreign Investments Act (FIA), as amended. Further, the law allows 100% foreign ownership in export enterprises whose products and services do not fall within Lists A and B of the Foreign Investment Negative List.

Small and medium-sized domestic market enterprises with paid-in equity capital less than the equivalent of US\$200,000 are reserved to Philippine nationals. However, if the said enterprises are: (1) involved in advanced technology; (2) endorsed as startup or startup enablers pursuant to RA No. 11337 or the “Innovative Startup Act”; or (3) a majority of their direct employees are Filipinos, but in no case shall their number be less than fifteen (15), then a minimum paid-in capital of US\$100,000 shall be allowed to non-Philippine nationals.

Furthermore, upon the order of the President, IIPC shall review foreign investments involving military-related industries, cyber infrastructure, pipeline transportation, or such other activities which may threaten the territorial integrity and the safety, security and well-being of Filipino Citizens.

Stiffer punishments for public officials and employees involved in foreign investment promotions who violate anti-graft and corruption laws are also provided under this measure.

EDUCATION, ARTS AND CULTURE

R.A. No. 11713 – An Act Further Strengthening Teacher Education in the Philippines by Enhancing the Teacher Education Council, Establishing a Scholarship Program for Students in the Teacher Education Program, Institutionalizing the National Educators Academy of the Philippines, and Appropriating Funds Therefor, Amending for the Purpose Republic Act No. 7784, Entitled “An Act to Strengthen Teacher Education in the Philippines by Establishing Centers of Excellence, Creating a Teacher Education Council for the Purpose, Appropriating Funds Therefor, and for Other Purposes” (S. No. 2152/H. No. 10301) [April 27, 2022]

The law strengthens the Teacher Education Council and establishes a scholarship program for students in the teacher education program. It institutionalizes the National Educators’ Academy of the Philippines to provide quality professional development programs on teacher education for in-service teachers, school leaders and other teaching-related personnel in all public and private basic education institutions. It also establishes a scholarship program for deserving students pursuing teacher education degree, and for teachers and school leaders pursuing graduate degree programs.

The law creates the Teacher Education Center of Excellence (Teacher Education-COE) to be established in strategic places in each of the regions of the country. A Teacher Education-COE must have highly educated, professionally qualified and experienced faculties, recognized in their fields of study, exhibiting best practices in excellence in the education sector, integrity, commitment, promotes Filipino culture and dedicated to the philosophy, mission, vision and goals of the institution and education.

S. No. 2485 – An Act Creating a Second Congressional Commission on Education to Assess and Evaluate the State of Philippine Education and Recommend Innovative and Targeted Reforms in Education, Providing Funds Therefor, and for Other Purposes

The bill seeks to establish the Second Congressional Commission on Education (EDCOM II), a body that will undertake a comprehensive national assessment and evaluation of the performance of the Philippine Education Sector for the purpose of recommending transformative, concrete, and targeted reforms.

EDCOM II will be composed of 10 members, five each from the Senate and the House of Representatives and shall: a) Conduct a review of the observance of the respective legal mandates of the Department of Education, Commission on Higher Education, and Technical Education and Skills Development Authority; b) Determine the factors that have contributed to the continuing failure of learners’ performance on identified subject areas to meet desired international and local standards recommending specific targeted and time-bound solutions to enable education subsectors to improve performance vis-à-vis measurable indicators and delivers accessible, inclusive, and quality education that is at par with world standards; c) Identify best practices of various national and international education institutions that can be adopted across the entire education system; d) Propose a monitoring and evaluation plan to ensure the timely achievement of set targets; and e) Determine the role of local government units in the delivery of basic education services and propose additional legislation to further the objectives of the Act.

Upon the expiration of EDCOM II’s mandate, it shall be dissolved and a Joint Congressional Oversight Committee (JCOC)

shall be created to oversee, monitor, and evaluate its recommendations.

The funding of P20 Million for the implementation of this Act shall be sourced from the appropriations of both houses of Congress, both for a period of two (2) years, to commence on the Fiscal Year 2022, and subject to authorized increases that may be made by Congress.

S. No. 2522 – An Act Declaring the Second Thursday of January of Every Year a Special Working Holiday to be Known as National Baptist Day

The bill declares the second Thursday of January of every year as “National Baptist Day” and proclaims the same as a special working holiday. This is to recognize the Baptists for their continuous pursuit of evangelical mission that contribute to nation-building through the establishment of Christian schools that instill academic excellence and build character in individuals, and churches that proclaim, teach and share biblical principles for the betterment of society.

R. A. No. 11650 - An Act Instituting Services and Programs for Learners with Disabilities in Support of Inclusive Education, Establishing Inclusive Learning Resource Centers of Learners with Disabilities in All Municipalities and Cities, Providing for Standards, Appropriating Funds therefor, and for Other Purposes

The law creates a paradigm of “inclusive education”. In essence, inclusive education refers to a process of addressing and responding to the diversity of needs of all learners, by moving towards the end goal of full participation, presence, and achievement in learning, cultures, and communities. Inclusive education eliminates exclusion, within and from education,

through accommodation, modification, adaptation, and individualization in content, approaches, structures, and strategies, with a common vision that covers all learners.

This measure provides learners with disabilities, access to the general formal education system by providing support services and programs to cater to their special needs. The end goal is for learners with disabilities to enjoy full participation in the general education system, thus preparing them for adult living and community life as full-fledged members of Philippine society. The law prohibits the denial of admission or inclusion of any learner with disability in any public or private basic education school.

To operationalize inclusive education for learners with disabilities nationwide, the Act provides for the implementation of comprehensive inclusionary reforms within the basic education system. Aside from the allocation of significant budgetary and human capital resources, the law institutionalizes innovative programs to identify learners with disabilities, assess their unique needs, and provide quality services to address these needs and help them succeed within the framework of the formal education system.

ELECTION

R.A. No. 11591 – An Act Fixing the Last Day of Registration of Voters for the 2022 National and Local Elections (S. No. 2408/H. No. 10261) [September 30, 2021]

The law sets the last day of registration of voters for the 2022 National and Local Elections thirty (30) days after the effectivity of this Act.

ENERGY

R.A. No. 11592 – An Act Establishing the Regulatory Framework for the Safe Operations of the Liquefied Petroleum Gas Industry, Delineating the Powers and Functions of Various Government Agencies, Defining and Penalizing Certain Prohibited Acts (S. No. 1955/H. No. 9323) [October 14, 2021]

The LPG Industry Regulation Act seeks to strengthen and streamline the laws and regulations overseeing the domestic LPG industry. The law aims at instituting reforms in the LPG industry, addressing concerns on health, safety, security, environmental, and quality standards for the benefit of consumers as well as LPG industry players.

This law shall apply to the importation, refining, refilling, transportation, conveyance, distribution, marketing of LPG, and manufacturing, requalifying, exchanging, and swapping of LPG pressure vessels. It covers all LPG industry players from the bulk suppliers, refillers, brand owners and marketers to the dealers and retailers.

The DOE is tasked to regulate, supervise, and monitor the LPG industry participants, and to implement and ensure compliance with the quality and safety standards prescribed in the PNS. LPG players are required to secure license to operate from the DOE for a specific activity prior to their commencement of commercial operation. The license will be valid for three (3) years.

The law enumerates administrative and criminal penalties for specific violations such as hoarding, underfilling, illegal refilling and engaging in an activity without a license to operate, among others. Fines range from P5,000.00 to P1 million depending on the offense, aside from suspension of the license to operate, permanent disqualification from engaging in any activity as an

LPG industry participant, impounding of LPG products and even imprisonment, depending on the nature of the violation.

R.A. No. 11646 – An Act Promoting the Use of Microgrid Systems to Accelerate the Total Electrification of Unserved and Underserved Areas Nationwide (S. No. 1928/H. No. 8203) [January 21, 2022]

The Microgrid Systems Act aims to accelerate total electrification by allowing the private sector to participate in unserved and underserved areas of the country. The law also addresses the provision of reliable electricity as it paves the way for the installation of microgrid systems by accredited Microgrid System Providers (MGSPs). The MGSPs will be allowed to operate in any area where there is no electricity access or where the power connection does not provide 24/7 supply.

Microgrid system refers to a group of interconnected loads and generation facility with clearly defined electrical boundaries that acts as an integrated power generation and distribution system, whether or not connected to a distribution or transmission system. Likewise, microgrid system provider (MGSP) refers to a natural or juridical person whose business includes the installation, operation, and maintenance of microgrid systems in unserved or underserved areas nationwide.

The law mandates the Department of Energy (DOE) to declare unserved and underserved areas for electrification and service by prospective MGSPs.

Under the law, the Joint Congressional Energy Commission (JCEC) shall exercise oversight powers over the implementation of this Act. The DOE and ERC shall submit annually to the JCEC a thorough report on the implementation of this Act not later than March 15 of every year.

R.A. No. 11697 – An Act Providing for the Development of the Electric Vehicle Industry (S. No. 1382/H. No. 10213) [Lapsed into Law on April 15, 2022 Without the Signature of the President, in Accordance with Article VI, Section 27 (1) of the Constitution]

The law aims to institute the policy and regulatory framework for the use of e-vehicles (EVs), and the development of mandatory charging stations in every parking of public and private buildings and establishments, including gasoline stations.

This Act also provides that no permit will be issued for the construction or renovation of a building or establishment, unless the owner submits to the building official of the concerned local government unit and the DOE, a sworn affidavit that there are parking spaces dedicated for the exclusive use of e-vehicles (EVs), with a copy of the building plan incorporating the same.

Other government agencies that will play a role for attaining the long-term goal of stable energy prices and energy sufficiency are - the DOE which will craft a comprehensive roadmap for electric vehicles; and the Department of Trade and Industry which will develop the EV industry, as well as its charging stations, parts and components, and batteries. Likewise, the Department of Transportation will mandate the inclusion of green routes in local public transport route plans of local government units. The Energy Regulatory Commission will determine the rates charged by distribution utilities on all charging stations.

This law further provides fiscal and non-fiscal incentives for the import, manufacture, and use of EVs which include discounts on the motor vehicle user's charge as well as expedited registration procedures for EV users.

ENVIRONMENT

S. No. 2425 – An Act Institutionalizing the Practice of Extended Producer Responsibility on Plastic Packaging Waste, Amending for this Purpose Republic Act No. 9003, Otherwise Known as the ‘Ecological Solid Waste Management Act of 2000’

This bill seeks to amend RA 9003 or the Ecological Solid Waste Management Act by institutionalizing the Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR).

Large companies are mandated under the bill to adopt and implement policies for the proper management of plastic packaging wastes. It also seeks to incentivize innovation, motivate producers to take charge of the life cycle of their products, clearly define responsibility, and allows for better citizen participation in reaching objectives and goals.

Through the EPR, companies have the responsibility for the proper and effective recovery, treatment, recycling or disposal of their products after they have been sold and used by consumers. This is to reduce packaging waste generation and improve the recyclability and reusability of packaging wastes.

Violations of the provisions of this proposed law shall be penalized with fines ranging from P5 million to P20 million. The bill targets the companies to comply with the requirements of the proposed law until 2030.

JUDICIAL REFORMS

R.A. No. 11576 – An Act Further Expanding the Jurisdiction of the Metropolitan Trial Courts, Municipal Trial Courts in Cities, Municipal Trial Courts, and Municipal

Circuit Trial Courts, Amending for the Purpose Batas Pambansa Blg. 129, Otherwise Known as “The Judiciary Reorganization Act of 1980”, As Amended (S. No. 1886/H. No. 6589) [July 30, 2021]

The law expands the jurisdiction of the Metropolitan Trial Courts, Municipal Trial Courts in cities, Municipal Trial Courts, and Municipal Circuit Trial Courts by amending certain sections of Batas Pambansa Blg. 129, otherwise known as the “Judiciary Reorganization Act of 1980,” as amended.

The amendments in Section 19, paragraphs (2), (3), (4), (8) provide that the Regional Trial Courts shall exercise exclusive original jurisdiction in the following: (2) All civil actions which involve the title to, or possession of, real property, or any interest therein, where the assessed value exceeds P400,000.00 except for forcible entry into and unlawful detainer of lands or buildings, original jurisdiction over which is conferred upon the Metropolitan Trial Courts, and Municipal Trial Courts in Cities, Municipal Trial Courts, and Municipal Circuit Trial Courts; (3) All actions in admiralty and maritime jurisdiction where the demand or claim exceeds P2 million; (4) In all matters of probate, both testate and intestate, where the gross value of the estate exceeds P2 million; and (8) All other cases in which the demand, exclusive of interest, damages of whatever kind, attorney’s fees, litigation expenses and costs or the value of the property in controversy exceeds P2 million.

The amendments in Section 33 paragraphs (1), (3) and (4) provide that the Metropolitan Trial Courts, Municipal Trial Courts in Cities, Municipal Trial Courts, and Municipal Circuit Trial Courts shall exercise the following jurisdictions: (1) Exclusive original jurisdiction over civil actions and probate proceedings, testate and intestate, including the grant of provisional remedies in proper cases, where the value of the personal property, estate, or amount of the demand does not exceed P2 million, exclusive of interest, damages of whatever kind, attorney’s fees, litigation

expenses, and costs, the amount of which must be specifically alleged; (3) Exclusive original jurisdiction in all civil actions which involve title to, or possession of, real property, or any interest therein where the assessed value of the property or any interest therein does not exceed P400,000 exclusive of interest, damages of whatever kind, attorney’s fees, litigation expenses and costs; and (4) Exclusive original jurisdiction in admiralty and maritime actions where the demand or claim does not exceed P2 million.

R.A. No. 11594 – An Act Increasing the Penalties for Perjury, Amending for the Purpose Articles 183 and 184 of Act No. 3815, as Amended, Otherwise Known as “The Revised Penal Code” (S. No. 1354/H. No. 8268) [October 29, 2021]

The law increases the imposable penalty of *prision mayor* in its minimum period to *prision mayor* in its medium period upon any person who, knowingly makes untruthful statements and shall testify under oath, or make an affidavit, upon any material matter before a competent person authorized to administer an oath in cases in which the law requires.

Any person who, in case of a solemn affirmation made in lieu of an oath, shall commit any of the falsehoods mentioned under the law shall suffer consequent penalties. If the person responsible for the commission of a felony is a public officer or employee, the penalty to be imposed must be in its maximum period. The offender shall also suffer a fine not to exceed P1 millio and perpetual absolute disqualification to hold any appointive or elective position in the government or in any agency, entity or instrumentality.

It is likewise provided that any person who willfully and knowingly offers in evidence a false witness or testimony in any judicial or official proceeding, shall be guilty of false testimony and shall suffer the penalties provided thereunder.

R.A. No. 11643 – An Act Granting Survivorship Benefits to the Surviving Legitimate Spouse and Dependent Children of a Deceased Retired Member of the National Prosecution Service and Appropriating Funds Therefor (S. No. 2373/H. No. 9087) [January 11, 2022]

The law grants survivorship benefits to surviving legitimate spouse and dependent children of the deceased retired member of the National Prosecution Service (NPS), or a member who is eligible to retire optionally at the time of death. The members of the NPS shall include the prosecutors in the Office of the Secretary of Justice, the Regional Prosecution Offices and the Offices of the Provincial and City Prosecutors.

A dependent refers to the legitimate, illegitimate, or legally adopted child who is chiefly dependent on the said deceased member. Said dependent must not be more than 21 years of age, unmarried and not gainfully employed, or such dependent, regardless of age, is incapable of self-support due to mental or physical defect.

The surviving legitimate spouse shall continue to receive such retirement benefits during the spouse’s lifetime until one remarries. The surviving spouse and living dependent children shall equally share in the retirement benefits.

R.A. No. 11648 – An Act Providing for Stronger Protection Against Rape and Sexual Exploitation and Abuse, Increasing the Age for Determining the Commission of Statutory Rape, Amending for the Purpose Act No. 3815, as Amended, Otherwise Known as “The Revised Penal Code”, Republic Act No. 8353, also Known as “The Anti-Rape Law Of 1997”, and Republic Act No. 7610, as Amended, Otherwise Known as the “Special Protection of

Children Against Abuse, Exploitation and Discrimination Act” (S. No. 2332/H. No. 7836) [March 4, 2022]

The law increases the age for determining statutory rape and other acts of sexual abuse by amending the Revised Penal Code, the Anti-Rape Law of 1997 and the Special Protection of Children Against Abuse, Exploitation and Discrimination Act.

In the case of rape under Article 266-A of the RPC, the law now provides that rape is committed by a person who shall have carnal knowledge of another person when the offended party is under 16 years of age or is demented. As an exception, it is provided that there shall be no criminal liability on the part of a person having carnal knowledge of another person under 16 years of age when the age difference between the parties is not more than three (3) years. This particular sexual act is considered to be consensual, non-abusive, and non-exploitative. This exception, however, shall not apply if the victim is under 13 years of age.

Sections 5 (b), 7, 9, and 10 (b) of Republic Act No. 7610, otherwise known as the Special Protection of Children Against Abuse, Exploitation, and Discrimination Act have also been amended by this law. More specifically, it provides under Sec. 5 on Child Prostitution and Other Sexual Abuse that those who commit the act of sexual intercourse or lascivious conduct with a child exploited in prostitution or subjected to other sexual abuse, provided that the victim is under 16 years of age, shall be prosecuted under Article 335, paragraph 3, for rape and Article 336 of the Revised Penal Code for rape, or lascivious conduct, as the case may be. The penalty for lascivious conduct when the victim is under 16 years of age shall be reclusion temporal in its medium period.

R.A. No. 11691 – An Act Creating the Office of the Judiciary Marshals, Defining its Powers and Functions, and Appropriating Funds Therefor (S. No. 1947/H. 9086) [April 8, 2022]

The law creates the Office of the Judiciary Marshals under the control and supervision of the Supreme Court. This office shall be primarily responsible for the security, safety, and protection of the members, officials, personnel, and property of the Judiciary, including the integrity of the courts and their proceedings.

The Supreme Court shall determine the functions, powers and responsibilities of the officials and personnel of the Office of the Judiciary Marshals which shall include, among others, the power to make arrests and conduct searches and seizures in relation to their functions, and in accordance with the Constitution and existing laws. The Office of the Judiciary Marshals shall also have concurrent jurisdiction with other law enforcement agencies to undertake investigations of crimes and other offenses committed against justices, judges and other court personnel.

The Chief Marshal and the Deputy Marshal shall be appointed by the Supreme Court *en banc* and shall have salary grades of 30 and 29, respectively. They must be natural-born citizens of the Philippines, and must at least have been a full Colonel of the AFP or the PNP, or Assistant Regional Director of the NBI, with experience in investigation in all instances.

S. No. 1055 – An Act Establishing a Separate Facility for Prisoners Convicted of Heinous Crimes

The bill proposes the establishment of a separate state-of-the-art facility and maintenance of a secured, clean, and sanitary penitentiary for prisoners convicted of heinous crimes, under the operation of the Bureau of Prisons.

The transfer of inmates shall be headed by the Bureau of Corrections (BuCor). The bureau may seek the assistance of the Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG) through the Philippine National Police (PNP) when the means of transporting will be done through the use of an aircraft. Such transfer of inmates shall be made within a period of 30 days from the completion of the construction of the Heinous Crimes Facility.

The proposal requires that there shall be three Heinous Crime Facilities starting in Luzon, Visayas, and Mindanao.

A regular review of the implementation of this proposed measure shall be conducted by the committees of both the Senate and the House of Representatives that have jurisdiction over the matter. The Secretary of Justice shall promulgate the Implementing Rules and Regulations within 90 days upon the effectivity of this legislative proposal.

S. No. 2490 – An Act Strengthening the Office of the Government Corporate Counsel (OGCC) by Rationalizing and Further Professionalizing its Organization, Upgrading Positions and Appropriating Funds Therefor

The bill provides that the Office of the Government Corporate Counsel (OGCC) shall be the statutory counsel and principal law office of all government corporations. All government corporations shall refer to the OGCC all important legal questions for opinion and advice; all contracts for review, provided that the Government Corporate Counsel (GCC) may, from time to time, determine which contracts shall no longer be submitted to OGCC; and all cases for representation before regular courts, quasi-judicial bodies, administrative agencies and arbitral tribunals. The GCC may authorize the government corporation's legal department or retained counsel as collaborating counsel to handle cases, as the expediency of circumstances may warrant.

The OGCC shall exercise control and supervision over the legal departments of all government corporations; conduct periodic performance audit of the in-house lawyers or legal departments of government corporations; adjudicate all disputes on controversies exclusively between government corporations; investigate and hear administrative disciplinary cases involving all lawyers, officials and employees of government corporations upon the latter's request and recommend appropriate administrative sanctions; conduct fact-finding and preliminary investigation; and act as Corporate Secretary, among other functions.

The GCC shall have the rank, salary, allowances, retirement benefits, and privileges as the Presiding Justice of the Court of Appeals. He shall be assisted by a Deputy Government Corporate Counsel (DGCC) and 12 Assistant Government Corporate Counsels (AGCC) who shall have the rank, salary, allowances, retirement benefits, and privileges of an Associate Justice of the Court of Appeals.

LABOR, EMPLOYMENT AND HUMAN RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT

R.A. No. 11641 – An Act Creating the Department of Migrant Workers, Defining its Powers and Functions, Rationalizing the Organization and Functions of Government Agencies Related to Overseas Employment and Labor Migration, Appropriating Funds Therefor, and for Other Purposes (S. No. 2234/H. No. 5832) [December 30, 2021]

The law creates the Department of Migrant Workers and Overseas Filipinos (DMW) which shall absorb all the functions and mandate of the Philippine Overseas Employment

Administration (POEA) and all other entities mentioned therein. It shall be the primary agency tasked to protect the rights and promote the welfare of Overseas Filipino Workers (OFWs) and other Overseas Filipinos (OFs) regardless of status and the means of entry into the country of destination.

The DMW shall formulate and implement policies, undertake systems for regulating and monitoring the overseas employment of Filipino workers and reintegration of OFWs and other OFs, taking into consideration the national development programs formulated by the National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA). It shall also promote the empowerment and protection of OFWs by training them to gain appropriate knowledge and skills.

In order to operationalize the law, the DMW shall determine its organizational structure and create new divisions as it may deem necessary at the national, regional, provincial, and such other lower levels, and overseas.

The Migrant Workers Office (MWO) of the Philippine Foreign Service Post shall be the operating arm overseas of the DMW. Within three (3) years from the effectivity of the law, all Philippine Foreign Service Posts shall have an operational MWO. The Foreign Service Posts in countries with large concentration of OFWs shall be prioritized in the establishment of these MWOs. The MWO shall absorb all the powers, existing functions and personnel of the: Philippine Overseas Labor Offices (POLO); Office for the Social Welfare Attachè (OSWA); and the powers and functions of existing ATN units of Foreign Service Posts with regard to OFWs in all Philippine embassies and consulates.

The Overseas Workers Welfare Administration (OWWA) is now attached to the DMW for purposes of policy and program coordination. The OWWA, however, shall continue to function in

accordance with its own Charter except as otherwise provided under this Act. The OWWA Fund shall be used for the welfare of member-OFWs and their families with emphasis that it shall not be withdrawn to respond, aid, or in any manner augment any required expenditure by other government agencies.

A Congressional Oversight Committee on Migrant Workers is created to monitor and oversee the implementation of the provisions of this Act.

S. No. 1233 – An Act Expanding the Use of the Legal Assistance Fund, Amending for the Purpose Section 26 of Republic Act No. 8042, As Amended, Otherwise Known as the Migrant Workers and Overseas Filipinos Act of 1995

The bill seeks to amend RA 8042, as amended, by expanding the use of the Legal Assistance Fund to include fees for foreign lawyers to be hired by the head of mission of the Philippine embassy concerned. These lawyers are to represent migrant workers and overseas Filipinos facing charges, or in filing cases against abusive employers and other offenders abroad, and in obtaining bail bonds to secure the temporary release of migrant workers and overseas Filipinos in distress, as well as obtaining other kinds of bonds required by the foreign court, agency or tribunal where the case is pending.

It is mandated under the bill that the legal assistance fund shall be immediately available to all migrant workers and overseas Filipinos in distress, from the time of the commencement of the complaint, and in all stages of the proceedings until the promulgation and execution of judgment, and at all levels of appeal.

The Department of Foreign Affairs, in consultation with relevant government agencies and stakeholders, shall, within sixty (60) days from the approval of this proposal, promulgate the implementing rules and regulations for its effective implementation.

S. No. 1834 – An Act to Enhance the Philippine Digital Workforce Competitiveness, Establishing for the Purpose an Inter-Agency Council for Development and Competitiveness of Philippine Digital Workforce and for Other Purposes

The bill seeks to establish an Inter-Agency Council for the Development and Competitiveness of Philippine Digital Workforce, referred to as the Inter-Agency Council. It shall be chaired by the National Economic Development Authority (NEDA) and shall be composed of the following as members: the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE), Department of Trade and Industry (DTI), Department of Information and Communications Technology (DICT), Department of Science and Technology (DOST), Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG), Department of Education (DepED), Commission on Higher Education (CHED), and the Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA).

The Inter-Agency Council shall be the primary planning and implementing body in the promotion, development, and competitiveness of the Philippine digital workforce. It shall ensure that all Filipino youth, students and workers have access to and are provided with skills and competencies in digital contents, platforms and technology that are at par with global standards. It shall encourage digital innovations and entrepreneurship. Collaboration with all stakeholders from the government, industry and labor sector is also mandated in order to develop and implement a national roadmap on upskilling, re-skilling and training of the Filipino workforce to address the skills gaps, particularly, in digital technology and digital entrepreneurship.

The Inter-Agency Council is authorized to enter into public-private partnerships with experts, information technology-business process outsourcing (IT-BPO) industry associations, private companies and other stakeholders in the formulation and

implementation of training, skills development, and certification programs.

LOCAL/REGIONAL GOVERNMENT

R.A. No. 11593 – An Act Resetting the First Regular Elections in the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao, Amending for the Purpose, Section 13, Article XVI of Republic Act No. 11054, Otherwise Known as the “Organic Law for the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao” (S. No. 2214/H. No. 10121) [October 28, 2021]

The law amends Section 13, Article XVI of Republic Act No. 11054, otherwise known as the “Organic Law for the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM).

Under the law, the first regular election for the Bangsamoro Government under the Organic Law, shall be held and synchronized with the 2025 national elections. The Commission on Elections, through the Bangsamoro Electoral Office, shall promulgate the rules and regulations for the conduct of the elections, enforce and administer them pursuant to national laws, the Organic Law and the Bangsamoro Electoral Code.

The Bangsamoro Transition Authority (BTA) shall continue as the interim government in BARMM. It should be noted though that under the law, the President may appoint the eighty (80) new interim members of the BTA who shall serve up to June 30, 2025 or until the successors shall have been elected and qualified.

R.A. No. 11683 – An Act Amending Section 450 of Republic Act No. 7160, Otherwise Known as The Local Government Code of 1991, as Amended by Republic Act No. 9009, by

Providing for the Requisites for the Conversion of a Municipality into a Component City, and for Other Purposes (S. No. 255/H. No. 8207) [Lapsed into Law on April 10, 2022 Without the Signature of the President, in Accordance with Article VI, Section 27 (1) Of The Constitution.)

This law amends Section 450 of RA 7160 or the Local Government Code of 1991, easing the conversion of a municipality into a component city.

Under this law, a municipality or a cluster of barangays with a locally generated average annual income, as certified by the Department of Finance, of at least P400 million for the last two (2) consecutive years, based on 2012 constant prices, may also be converted into a component city. In addition, a municipality or a cluster of barangays must either have a population of 100,000 inhabitants as certified by the Philippine Statistics Authority; or a contiguous territory of at least 100 square kilometers, as certified by the Land Management Bureau.

R.A. No. 11768 – An Act Strengthening the Sangguniang Kabataan, Institutionalizing Additional Reforms to Revitalize Youth Participation in Local Governance and by Providing Honorarium, Other Benefits, and Privileges, Amending for the Purpose Certain Sections of Republic Act No. 10742, Otherwise Known as the “Sangguniang Kabataan Reform Act of 2015” (S. No. 2124/H. No. 10698) [May 6, 2022]

The law institutionalizes additional reforms to empower the Sangguniang Kabataan (SK) in fulfilling their mandates as youth public servants by providing them more benefits and privileges. Under this law, all SK officials will be entitled to a monthly honorarium of not more than 25% of the SK Funds and not more than the pay earned by the SK Chairperson.

This law grants appropriate civil service eligibility to the SK officials based on their years of service. It specifies the Philippine Youth Development Plan (PYDP) thrusts, which include health, education, environment, human rights, gender equality, and economic empowerment. The law also allows SK to set aside an amount (not more than 15% of SK Fund) for mandatory and continuing training of SK members.

The presidents of the Panlalawigang Pederasyon ng mga Sangguniang Kabataan and the presidents of the Panlungsod na Pederasyon ng mga Sangguniang Kabataan of highly urbanized cities and independent component cities, shall elect among themselves a representative who shall sit as an *ex officio* member of the National Youth Commission.

The law further mandates that DepEd, CHED, and TESDA shall design and implement mandatory training programs and relevant courses to enhance the knowledge, network, and capacity of SK officials and LYDC members.

PUBLIC INFORMATION AND MASS MEDIA

R.A. No. 11699 – An Act Declaring August 30 of Every Year as “National Press Freedom Day” and for Other Purposes (S. No. 670/H. No. 9182) [April 13, 2022]

The law declares August 30 of every year as National Press Freedom Day, a working holiday, in honor of Marcelo H. del Pilar, father of Philippine Journalism.

It is provided under this law that all government agencies, the military, police, and the local government units, as well as private sector, shall afford sufficient time and opportunity for their employees to engage and participate in any related activity to be

conducted in the premises of their respective offices or establishments.

Further, the Department of Education, Commission on Higher Education, and the Technical Education and Skills Development Authority shall consult with the Office of the President and public and private media organizations in organizing activities that raise people’s consciousness on the importance of the press and its rights and responsibilities.

PUBLIC ORDER AND NATIONAL RECONCILIATION

R.A. No. 11589 – An Act Strengthening and Modernizing the Bureau of Fire Protection and Appropriating Funds Therefor (S. No. 1832/H. No. 7406) [September 10, 2021]

The law amends RA 6975 or the Department of Interior and Local Government Act of 1990. It enhances and modernizes the Bureau of Fire Protection (BFP), expands its mandate and capability, and ensures its responsiveness to the changing needs of the community.

Under this law, the BFP shall have the following powers and functions, among others: 1) Prevent and suppress all destructive fires on buildings, houses and other structures, including those that occur in economic zones and other similar entities; forests; land transportation vehicles and equipment; ships or vessels docked at piers or wharves or anchored in major seaports, petroleum industry installations; and airports, in the event of plane crashes and other similar incidents; 2) In coordination with the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council and the LGUs, respond to natural or man-made disasters and other emergencies, including the conduct of rescue operations, medical

emergencies, and containment of hazardous materials (HAZMAT), chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear and explosive (CBRNE) materials; 3) Issue implementing rules and regulations, and prescribe standards on the enforcement of Fire Code of the Philippines of 2008; 4) Per Ease of Doing Business and Efficient Government Service Delivery Act of 2018, evaluate plans and other pertinent documents submitted by building owners, and issue a fire safety evaluation clearance as a prerequisite for the issuance of the building permit; 5) Investigate all causes of fires, and if necessary, file the proper complaints with the city or provincial prosecutor who has jurisdiction over the case; 6) Conduct training of its personnel and officers including fire volunteers, fire safety practitioners and fire volunteer organizations, pertaining to fire prevention and suppression, fire inspection and clearance, investigation, disaster preparedness, rescue, emergency medical response, HAZMAT, CBRNE, and other operations; and 7) Request assistance from the Philippine National Police (PNP), Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP), or any government agency or instrumentality, including government-owned and/or controlled corporations and LGUs, in the exercise of its powers and functions, including the use of these agencies' personnel and facilities upon approval of the head of the agency concerned.

A BFP Modernization Program shall also be established and implemented for 10 years and must have the following components: 1) fire protection service; 2) force restructuring and organizational development; 3) capability, material, and technology development; 4) specialized services development; and 5) human resource development. The modernization program shall also have local equity. City and municipal governments shall be authorized to use their respective share from all taxes, fees, and fines collected for BFP-related activities.

R.A. No. 11766 – An Act Fixing the Validity Period of the License to Own and Possess, Registration, and Permit to Carry Firearms Outside of Residence or Place of Business,

Amending for the Purpose Sections 7 And 19 of Republic Act No. 10591, Otherwise Known as the “Comprehensive Firearms and Ammunition Regulation Act” (S. No. 1155/H. No. 10610) [May 6, 2022]

This law extends the validity of period of license to own and possess, registration, and permit to carry firearms outside of residence. It amends Sections 7 and 19 of the Comprehensive Firearms and Ammunition Regulation Act or RA 10591.

Section 7 of the law stipulates that a permit to carry firearms outside of residence shall be issued by the Chief of the PNP or the duly authorized representative to any qualified person whose life is under actual threat or is in imminent danger due to the nature of the person's profession, occupation or business.

Section 19 provides the terms on the renewal of license, and registration. The license as well as the registration of firearm shall be renewed every five years or ten years, at the option of the licensee, which shall be reckoned from the birthdate of the said licensee, unless sooner revoked or suspended. Further, failure to renew the license on or before the date of its expiration shall cause the revocation of the license and of the registration of the firearm or firearms under said licensee.

The application for the renewal of the license or registration may be submitted to the Firearms and Explosives Office of the Philippine National Police within six months before the date of the expiration of such license or registration.

R.A. No. 11709 – An Act Strengthening Professionalism and Promoting the Continuity of Policies and Modernization Initiatives in the Armed Forces of the Philippines, by Prescribing Fixed Terms for Key Officers thereof, Increasing the Mandatory Retirement Age of Generals/Flag Officers, Providing for a More Effective Attrition System,

**and Providing Funds Therefor (S. No. 2376/H. No. 10321)
[April 13, 2022]**

The law fixes the tour of duty of the Chief of Staff of the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) and other officers holding key positions, such as: The Vice Chief of Staff; Deputy Chief of Staff; Commanding General, Philippine Army; Commanding General, Philippine Air Force; Flag Officer in Command, Philippine Navy; Unified Command Commanders; and Inspector General to three (3) consecutive years unless sooner terminated by the President. The tour of duty of such officers shall commence on the date the appointment is signed.

The Philippine Military Academy (PMA) Superintendent shall have the rank of Lieutenant General/Vice Admiral and be given a tour of duty of four (4) years unless sooner terminated by higher authority. The PMA Superintendent shall not be eligible for any other position in the AFP and shall be compulsorily retired after completion of the fixed tour of duty or upon relief from office except for the position of Chief of Staff. No General/Flag Officer (FO) shall be appointed as PMA Superintendent if the General or FO is already more than 58 years of age.

The tour of duty of the Chief of Staff shall not exceed three (3) years except in times of war or other national emergency as declared by Congress. The President may extend such tour of duty under these circumstances.

It is also specifically provided that no retired or resigned military officer may be appointed as SND within one (1) year from the date of his retirement or resignation. The AFP Chief of Staff shall submit to the Department of National Defense (DND) an accurate, comprehensive, and up-to-date Personnel Management Report. This report shall include information on the number of military personnel, rank, place of designation, and list

of attrited personnel, on an annual basis on or before the end of April of every year.

The amount necessary for the implementation of this law shall be charged to the appropriations of the DND under the current General Appropriations Act. Thereafter, such amount shall be included in the annual General Appropriations Act.

S. No. 2423 – An Act Strengthening the Regulation of Private Security Services Industry, Repealing for the Purpose, Republic Act No. 5487, Entitled, ‘An Act to Regulate the Organization and Operation of Private Detective, Watchmen or Security Guard Agencies’, As Amended

This bill adopts measures to strengthen the regulation of private security services industry. It establishes standards to ensure the professional competence of private security personnel and professionals that complement the law enforcement authorities in the preservation of public order in the country.

As defined under the bill, a private security agency (PSA) is any Filipino citizen or juridical entity wholly owned and controlled by Filipino citizens that may organize a private security agency and provide security services. Such PSA shall not employ more than two thousand (2,000) private security professionals as provided under Section 5 of the bill.

The proposed law enumerates the qualifications of a PSA Operator or Licensee. In case of a juridical entity, the named operator or licensee shall be its President or any of its directors, duly authorized by their Board of Directors.

A license to operate (LTO) issued by the Chief PNP is required to operate and manage a private security agency (PSA) and private security training agency (PSTA). A training school

shall offer courses prescribed and approved by the PNP or training programs accredited by TESDA. The LTO is valid for a maximum period of five (5) years, subject to renewal. But the Chief PNP may set a shorter validity period for LTO with applicable fair and reasonable fees adjusted accordingly.

Corresponding penalties such as revocation of license and fines are provided for any violations of the provisions of the proposed law.

S. No. 2501 – An Act Penalizing Wilful and Indiscriminate Discharge of Firearms, Amending for the Purpose Act No. 3815, as Amended, otherwise known as The Revised Penal Code

The bill proposes to amend Article 155 on Alarms and Scandals as well as Art. 254 on Discharge of Firearms of Act No. 3815 or the Revised Penal Code, as amended.

Significantly, new sub-paragraphs under Art. 254 are added, as follows:

“b) Any person who shall wilfully and indiscriminately discharge any firearm or other device that may not have been designed as firearm but can be functionally used as a firearm/ shall suffer the penalty of arresto mayor in rrs maximum period/ unless the facts of the case can be held to constitute any other offense of which a higher penalty is prescribed.

c) If the person who commits the offense provided in this Article is a member of the military and military auxillary agencies/or law enforcement agencies/authorized to bear firearms and such discharge is not in the performance of official duties, the penalty one degree higher than that

prescribed above shall be imposed and the offender may be held administratively liable.”

In addition, to the penalties imposed herein, any firearm license or permit issued in favor of the offender shall be summarily cancelled, and the offender shall be perpetually disqualified from being granted any firearm license or permit.”

PUBLIC SERVICES

R.A. No. 11659 – An Act Amending Commonwealth Act No. 146, Otherwise Known as the Public Service Act, as Amended (S. No. 2094/H. No. 78) [March 21, 2022]

The law amends Commonwealth Act. No. 146 by liberalizing previously restricted service industries to encourage private enterprise and foreign investment.

The President may recommend to Congress the classification of a public service as a public utility, upon the recommendation of the National Economic Development Authority (NEDA).

Any entity controlled by or acting on behalf of a foreign government or foreign state-owned enterprises shall be prohibited from owning capital in any public service classified as public utility or critical infrastructure. Further, these foreign state-owned enterprises which own capital prior to the effectivity of this law are prohibited from investing in additional capital.

Foreign nationals shall not be allowed to own more than fifty percent (50%) of the capital of entities engaged in the operation and management of critical infrastructure unless the country of such foreign national accords reciprocity to Philippine nationals.

A foreign national shall be employed in a public service, only after the non-availability of a Philippine national who is willing to perform the services for which the foreign national is desired. Any foreign national seeking admission to the Philippines for employment must obtain an employment permit pursuant to the Labor Code of the Philippines.

R.A. No. 11698 – An Act Regulating the Use and Other Activities Related to Vintage Automobiles and Other Historical, Classic, or Collector Motor Vehicles, and Providing for their Exemption from the Standards and Restrictions Set by Laws, and Regulations Issued After the Date of their Manufacture (S. No. 2493/H. No. 9884) [Lapsed into Law on April 15, 2022 without the signature of the President, in accordance with Article VI, Section 27 (1) of the 1987 Constitution.]

The law covers all the aspects of regulation of vintage vehicles, its protection, preservation, enhancement and promotion as a nation’s heritage, including the establishment and strengthening of policies that encourage the same.

This particular Act increases economic opportunities from conditions favorable to small and medium industries that may participate in international markets for the restoration and repair of vintage vehicles, as well as in the manufacture of spare and replacement parts.

Under the law, restoration shops and companies which are in the business of importation of vintage vehicles for restoration in the Philippines and for export of the same, shall be eligible to avail of the fiscal and tax incentives provided in Republic Act No. 11534 or the “CREATE Law”. Other incentives include exemption from the Clean Air Act, anti-pollution tests, safety and road-use, and other standards that were not in force at the time of the manufacture of these vintage cars.

Vehicles that can register and benefit from the law should be 40 years old from the date of manufacture and whose chassis, engine, steering, and suspension are either original or authentic and whose body has not been altered in general appearance. It is provided, however, that vintage vehicles manufactured after Dec. 31, 1967 must be fitted with safety belts as mandated by RA 8750 or the Seat Belts Use Act of 1999.

Vintage vehicles shall not be used as a public utility vehicle or for the commercial transport of persons or goods.

S. No. 1077 – An Act Creating a National Transportation Safety Board and Appropriating Funds Therefor

The bill seeks to promote safety in the transportation of people and goods through cost-effective measures that may prevent, remedy or mitigate crashes, accidents, and serious incidents involving any mode of transport.

The bill proposes the creation of a National Transport Safety Board (NTSB) consisting of seven (7) full-time members, who shall be appointed by the President. The Board shall be headed by the Chairman, who shall be the Chief Executive Officer of the Board, shall have a term of five (5) years but may be renewed for a non-extendible period of one (1) year. The Members of the Board must represent each of the transportation sectors (land, rail, air, and sea). At least two (2) of the full-time members must come from the commuting public representing organizations advocating for road safety.

The Board shall have an Executive Director who will be appointed by the Chairman.

The Board shall submit a report to Congress and the President within sixty (60) days from the completion of the Board’s investigation on each incident. However, said report shall not be

admitted as evidence or used in any suit or action for damages, except when the criminal aspect of the accident or incident is put into issue.

S. No. 1582 – An Act Establishing a Network of Pop-Up Bicycle Lanes and Emergency Pathways for Use During the Duration of the Covid-19 Pandemic, and for Other Purposes

This bill, to be known as the Safe Pathways Act, creates a network of pop-up bicycle lanes and people-oriented emergency pathways in local government units (LGUs).

The pathways are intended for non-motorized vehicles only, such as bicycles. This is in line with the need for physical distancing and limited mobility, amid the lack of public transport in the time of COVID-19 pandemic. These lanes, while intended for non-motorized vehicles, may accommodate electric scooters, electric tricycles, and similar transport modes subject to guidelines to be set by the Department of Transportation (DOTr) and other agencies. These pathways shall directly connect to medical facilities and other private and public places.

The bill also mandates the provision of adequate parking spaces for non-motorized vehicles in all public places, government offices, and major commercial establishments. To promote the use of non-motorized transport modes, public and private sectors are also instructed to develop necessary infrastructure facilities and programs for its implementation.

This measure also provides that the DOTr, DILG, and Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH), in coordination with relevant agencies, shall prepare to permanently adopt the safe pathways measure, as appropriate.

The LGUs shall coordinate and issue the necessary measures for adoption and implementation of this proposed law.

S. No. 2395 – An Act to Eradicate Mobile Phone-Aided Terrorism and Criminal Activities, Mandating for this Purpose Ownership Registration of All Sim Cards for Cellular Phones (*Vetoed by the President*)

The proposed “SIM (Subscriber Identity Module) Card Registration Act” mandates all Public Telecommunications Entity (PTE) to require the registration of SIM cards as pre-requisite to its sale. This bill aims to deter the proliferation of SIM card-aided crimes, such as terrorism, text scams, unsolicited and indecent or obscene messages, bank fraud, and massive disinformation.

All existing SIM card subscribers with active services shall register with their respective PTEs within a year from effectivity of this Act. PTEs shall automatically deactivate or retire the SIM card number if the subscriber fails to register within the prescribed period.

The National Telecommunications Commission (NTC), in coordination with the PTEs, the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI), the Department of Information and Communications Technology (DICT), the National Privacy Commission (NPC), and in consultation with major consumer groups, shall formulate the guidelines for the implementation of the SIM card registration process.

The NTC shall ensure that any information obtained in the SIM card registration process shall be treated as absolutely confidential, in accordance with the provisions of the Data Privacy Act of 2012, and cannot be disclosed to unauthorized persons, except upon the written consent of the subscriber. Violations of the provisions of this bill have corresponding penalties.

**RATIFICATION OF TREATIES
AND/OR INTERNATIONAL AGREEMENTS**

Res. No. 128 – Resolution Concurring in the Accession to the Convention on Temporary Admission (PSR-832)
[November 8, 2021]

This resolution concurs with the country’s accession to the Convention on Temporary Admission (CTA). The Convention obligates Contracting Parties to provide temporary admission of goods with total conditional relief from import duties and taxes. It also requires simplified processes for temporary admission of goods into a customs territory.

The Convention provides, among other things, that it will enter into force three months after the instrument of accession has been deposited by a Contracting Party. The resolution of concurrence also stipulates that any Contracting Party which has entered reservations may withdraw them, in whole or in part, at any time, by notification to the depositary specifying the date on which such withdrawal takes effect.

The Philippine Senate concurs in the accession to the Convention on Temporary Admission subject to specific reservations pursuant to Article 29 of the Convention. The President of the Philippines ratified the Convention on April 28, 2021 and had submitted it to the Senate for concurrence, in accordance with the 1987 Philippine Constitution.

Res. No. 134 – Resolution Concurring in the Accession to the 1961 Convention on the Reduction Of Statelessness (PSR-964) [January 25, 2022]

This resolution concurs with the country’s accession to the 1961 Convention on the Reduction of Statelessness. The President of the Philippines ratified the 1961 Convention on August 3, 2021 and has accordingly submitted it to the Senate for concurrence, in accordance with the 1987 Philippine Constitution.

The 1961 Convention on the Reduction of Statelessness was signed on August 30, 1961, and entered into force on December 13, 1975. It establishes a system of common rules and provides detailed and concrete safeguards to ensure an appropriate response to the threat of statelessness. The Philippines concurs in the accession to the 1961 Convention on the Reduction of Statelessness with specific declarations pertinent to the 1987 Philippine Constitution and other existing Philippine laws.

Res. No. 135 – Resolution Concurring in the Ratification of the Arms Trade Treaty (PSR-960) [January 26, 2022]

The Arms Trade Treaty (ATT) was adopted on April 2, 2013 at the United Nations Assembly. It underlines the need to prevent and eradicate the illicit trade in conventional arms and to prevent their diversion to the illicit market.

The ATT affirms the sovereign right of any State to regulate and control conventional arms exclusively within its territory, pursuant to its own legal or constitutional system. Furthermore, it acknowledges that peace and security, development, and human rights are interlinked and mutually reinforcing, and are the pillars of the United Nations system and foundations for collective security.

The President of the Philippines ratified the treaty on December 29, 2016 and has accordingly submitted it to the Senate for concurrence, in accordance with the 1987 Philippine Constitution.

SOCIAL JUSTICE, WELFARE AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT

S. No. 2506 – An Act Increasing the Social Pension of Indigent Senior Citizens and Appropriating Funds Therefor, Amending for the Purpose Republic Act No. 7432 Entitled, An Act to Maximize the Contribution of Senior Citizens to Nation Building, Grant Benefits and Special Privileges and for Other Purposes, as Amended, and for Other Purposes

This bill mandates that the monthly social pension of indigent citizens shall not be less than P1,000. This amount shall be adjusted every two years after the effectivity of this measure, considering the present consumer price index as published by the Philippine Statistics Authority (PSA) and other economic indicators. In the formulation of the mandated social pension, the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) and the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) shall review and consult with other stakeholders.

The monthly stipend shall be released to the beneficiaries in cash as direct remittance through a service provider accredited by the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas (BSP), electronic transfer, or through other modes which are practical and acceptable to the beneficiary. Any fees, such as transaction fees for the conveyance of such funds, shall not be charged to the beneficiary.

The function of implementation, management, and distribution of funds to the senior citizens shall be transferred from the DSWD to the National Commission of Senior Citizens (NCSC) within a period of three (3) years from the effectivity of this proposed measure.

The DSWD and the NCSC shall come up with an updated and valid list of beneficiaries of this measure, in cooperation with the local government units and the PSA through the community-

based monitoring system, mandated by R. A. No. 11315 or the Community-Based Monitoring System Act.

SPORTS

S. No. 2077 – An Act Creating the Philippine Boxing and Combat Sports Commission and for Other Purposes

This bill creates the Philippine Boxing and Combat Sports Commission that shall be in the forefront of promoting the welfare of boxers and other combat sports professionals. This measure envisions that it shall lead the country into becoming an international or regional hub for professional boxing and combat sports.

As proposed, the Commission shall be under the Office of the President and composed of a chairperson and four (4) members. The chair shall be an advocate of professional boxing and combat sports. The other three (3) members shall be secretaries or their representatives from the following departments: 1) Department of Health (DOH); 2) Department of Tourism (DOT); and 3) Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG). The fourth member shall be a representative of the professional boxing and combat sports industry.

The Commission shall formulate, initiate, plan, and implement a national policy for the growth of professional boxing and combat sports in the country, and the discovery, training, and development of professional boxers and combatants. It shall establish rules with regard to qualifications of a boxer or sports combatant, coach, trainer, promoter, judge, and other personnel involved in a match. It shall set up rules and conditions for the grant of license or permit to hold a match and impose sanctions for violation of said rules and conditions. It shall determine safety standards, such as emergency services for persons involved in a

match, require registration of boxers and other personnel in the boxing and combat sports industry, among others.

The Commission shall establish a Professional Boxers and Combatants Welfare Trust Fund. This shall be a resource for medical and health services, housing and livelihood assistance, financial assistance for education, and capability building of the boxers and sports combatant.

TAX MEASURES

R.A. No. 11590 – An Act Taxing Philippine Offshore Gaming Operations, Amending for the Purpose Sections 22, 26, 27, 28, 106, 108, and Adding New Sections 125-A and 288(G) of the National Internal Revenue Code of 1997, as Amended, and for Other Purposes (S. No. 2232/H. No. 5777) [September 22, 2021]

This law taxes the Offshore Gaming Licensee (OGL), also known as offshore gaming operator, its employees, and its accredited service providers.

An OGL is a gaming operator duly licensed and authorized by the Philippine Amusement and Gaming Corporation (PAGCOR) through a gaming license. The OGL can also acquire such license from a special economic zone authority, a tourism zone authority or a free port authority. In conducting gaming operations, it can accept bets from offshore clients and shall be charged with taxes on all its gaming-revenues and on non-gaming revenues.

The OGL operator shall be charged with a gaming tax of five percent (5%) of gaming income. The gaming income tax shall be directly remitted to the Bureau of Internal Revenue (BIR) not later than the twentieth (20th) day following the end of each month.

Income tax on non-gaming revenues of Philippine-based OGL and other taxes on alien individuals employed by the OGL, as well as accredited service providers are also provided under the law.

The law prescribes sanctions for employers and service providers who fail to obtain tax identification number (TIN) for their foreign employees. This act provides that all OGLs and their service providers that employ or engage a foreign national without said TIN shall be fined twenty thousand pesos (PhP20,000.00) for every foreign national without TIN. In some instances, revocation of the OGLs and their service providers' primary and other licenses obtained from government agencies, and/or perpetual or temporary ban in employing or engaging foreign nationals in their operations are also enforced. Regardless, the alien concerned shall still pay, and the employer shall remit any taxes, penalties, interests, and surcharges due in accordance with this Act.

S. No. 2520 – An Act Exempting from Income Taxation the Honoraria, Allowances, and Other Financial Benefits of Persons Rendering Service During an Election Period, Amending for the Purpose Section 32(B)(7) of the National Internal Revenue Code of 1997, as Amended

This bill exempts from tax the honoraria, travel allowance, and benefits granted by the Commission on Elections (COMELEC) to persons rendering election services pursuant to Section 4 of Republic Act 10756. This provision shall apply to the May 9, 2022 national and local elections and thereafter.

TRADE, COMMERCE AND ENTREPRENEURSHIP

R.A. No. 11595 – An Act Amending Republic Act No. 8762, Otherwise Known as the “Retail Trade Liberalization Act

of 2000”, by Lowering the Required Paid-Up Capital for Foreign Retail Enterprises, and for Other Purposes (S. No. 1840/H. No. 59) [December 10, 2021]

This law mandates that a foreign retailer shall, at all times, maintain a minimum paid-up capital of P25 million in their retail firm in the Philippines, regardless if it is a single proprietorship, an association, partnership or a corporation.

In instances when the foreign retailer is engaged in retail trade in more than one physical store in the country, the minimum investment for each store shall be P10 million.

The SEC shall be in charge of monitoring the performance of foreign retailer partnerships, associations, and corporations. The DTI shall be in charge of monitoring foreign single proprietorship. Overall, the DTI, SEC, BSP and the National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA) shall review the minimum paid-up capital every three (3) years from the effectivity of this Act. The recommendation of these agencies shall then be submitted to Congress.

Violators of any provision under this Act shall pay a fine of not less than P1 million but not more than P5 million, and an imprisonment of not less than four (4) years to six (6) years. Specifically, failure to maintain the minimum paid-up capital prior to notification to the SEC or DTI shall subject the violator to penalties or restriction on future trading activities/ businesses in the Philippines.

R.A. No. 11711 – An Act Further Amending Republic Act No. 4566, as Amended, Otherwise Known as The Contractors’ License Law (S. No. 2247/H. No. 7808) [April 27, 2022]

It is provided under the law that the contractor shall be permitted to operate within one year from the date of issuance of

the license. However, if the contractor has been operating and in good standing for twenty-five (25) years or more, the license may be renewed every three (3) years. If the contractor is in good standing and operating for ten (10) years but less than twenty-five (25) years, the license may be renewed every two (2) years. If the contractor is in good standing but operating for less than ten (10) years, the license shall be renewed every year.

R.A. No. 11706 – An Act Providing for the Establishment of Timbangan ng Bayan Centers in Public and Private Markets, Amending for the Purpose Chapter II, Title III of Republic Act No. 7394, Otherwise Known as the “Consumer Act of the Philippines” (S. No. 1241/H. No. 3255) [April 13, 2022]

This law mandates the setting up of accessible *Timbangan ng Bayan* Centers in all public and private markets as well as in the supermarkets, flea markets or *tiangges*, and grocery stores within the respective localities of all provinces, cities, and municipalities.

This measure further cites that market supervisors shall be in charge of the safekeeping and maintenance of all weighing and measuring instruments. They shall be in charge of keeping a record of every product found to be lacking in quantity or is substandard in dimension, as well as the record of where such product was brought, including the names of the proprietor or manager of said establishments.

The Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) shall provide assistance in the setting up of *Timbangan ng Bayan* Centers nationwide under its consumer protection and other relevant programs.

Sanctions for those found to have tampered, vandalized or destroyed any scale, balance, weight or measure of a *Timbangan ng Bayan*, after it is officially sealed, are stipulated

under the law. It specifies hefty monetary penalties and imprisonment for those found in violation of any of its provisions.

S. No. 2239 – An Act Regulating the Importation, Manufacture, Sale, Packaging, Distribution, Use, and Communication of Vapor Products and Heated Tobacco Products

This bill regulates the importation, manufacture, sale, packaging, distribution, use, advertisement, promotion, and sponsorship of vaporized nicotine products (VNP), including refills, related devices, and tobacco products for heating which result to an aerosol for inhalation.

Textual and graphic health warnings, prescribed under RA 10643 or the Graphic Health Warnings Law, are mandated to be placed on the products' packaging which should be child-resistant and tamper-proof.

Sale and distribution provisions require a minimum age of not less than eighteen (18) years of age. Online selling of said products is allowed under the strictest of terms and only by vendors registered with the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) or the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC).

Promotional activities or advertisements on the VNP in multi-media platforms are restricted. This bill also provides for the setting up of vaping areas as well as its standard physical requirements like ventilation systems and buffer zones.

S. No. 2302 – An Act Providing Measures to Protect Individuals Engaged in Food, Grocery and Pharmacy Delivery Services

This bill provides for the protection of delivery riders or drivers who pick up ordered items from third party sellers and

deliver such to customers. These items may be food, grocery or pharmaceutical products.

It is provided under this proposed measure that riders/delivery persons shall be assured of their service fees due them for confirmed orders in instances such as: (1) when there is cancellation of confirmed orders; and (2) when there is investigation or inquiry conducted by service providers on the propriety or validity of cancellation of orders.

Moreover, this bill prohibits the service provider from requiring advance payment from delivery riders. It shall not be the responsibility of these riders to pursue claims for collection from customers who cancel their orders. Relatedly, this measure prohibits the following: (1) use of another person's personal information such as name, address and contact numbers when registering for service delivery; (2) cancellation of confirmed orders; (3) placing of hoax orders; and (4) refusal to receive unpaid order.

Service providers who violate the prohibition on advance payments shall be penalized with *arresto mayor* and/or fine of an amount not exceeding P100,000, with its licenses and permits revoked. Any other violations under this proposed measure shall be subject to the same sanctions.

S. No. 2455 – An Act to Develop and Promote the Creative Industries of the Philippines

This bill establishes the Creative Industries Development Council to be in the forefront of developing and promoting the Philippine creative industries.

Creative Industries are trades involving persons, natural or juridical, that produce cultural, artistic, and innovative goods and services originating in human creativity, skill, and talent and

have the potential to create wealth through the generation and utilization of intellectual property.

The proposal categorizes creative industries into the following domains: 1) audio visual media; 2) digital interactive media; 3) creative services; 4) design; 5) publishing and printed media; 6) performing arts; 7) visual arts; 8) traditional cultural expressions; 9) cultural sites; and 10) other domains and industries as the Council may define, subject to its criteria and guidelines.

The Council shall be attached to the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI). It shall be composed of eighteen (18) members, nine (9) of whom are ex-officio members and the other nine (9) are regular members who come from the private sector. The ex-officio members shall be composed of secretaries/heads or their designated representatives from the following government agencies: (1) DTI, whose secretary shall also be the Council's chair; (2) Department of Education (DepEd); (3) Department of Science and Technology (DOST); (4) National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA); (5) Department of Tourism (DOT); (6) Department of Information and Communication Technology (DICT); (7) Commission on Higher Education (CHED); (8) National Commission for Culture and the Arts (NCCA); and (9) Intellectual property Office of the Philippines (IPO-Phil). The other nine (9) regular members who come from the private sector shall represent each one of the specific domains. A co-chair of the Council shall be elected from among the regular members.

YOUTH, WOMEN, CHILDREN, FAMILY RELATIONS AND GENDER EQUALITY

R.A. No. 11596 – An Act Prohibiting the Practice of Child Marriage and Imposing Penalties for Violations Thereof (S. No. 1373/H. No. 9943) [December 10, 2021]

The law considers a crime the act of child marriage and penalizes any person who facilitates and solemnizes this union with the penalty of *prison mayor* in its medium period and a fine of not less than P40,000.

Child Marriage, as defined, is any marriage entered into and solemnized in civil or church proceedings, or in any recognized traditional, cultural or customary manner, where one or both parties are persons below 18 years of age, or those unable to fully take care of themselves or protect themselves from abuse, exploitation, or discrimination because of a physical or mental disability or condition.

Moreover, this law introduces a culturally-appropriate program and services that will be responsive to the needs of those who will be affected by this law. The Department of Social Welfare and Development shall be the lead duty-bearer in the formulation of such program and services, including the implementation of the law.

R.A. No. 11642 – An Act Strengthening Alternative Child Care by Providing for an Administrative Process of Domestic Adoption, Reorganizing for the Purpose the Inter-Country Adoption Board (ICAB) into the National Authority for Child Care (NACC), Amending for the Purpose Republic Act No. 8043, Republic Act No. 11222, and Republic Act No. 10165, Repealing Republic Act No. 8552, and Republic Act No. 9523, and Appropriating Funds Therefor (S. No. 1933/H. No. 8998) [January 6, 2022]

The law provides for the reorganization of the Inter-Country Adoption Board (ICAB) into a one-stop quasi-judicial agency on alternative child care, known as the National Authority for Child Care (NACC), which shall be attached to the DSWD. The duties, functions, and responsibilities of the ICAB, the DSWD,

and those other government agencies involving alternative child care and adoption are now transferred to the NACC.

NACC is composed of the Secretary of DSWD as ex-officio chairperson and six other members to be appointed by the President for a non-renewable term of six years. The six members should include a psychiatrist or psychologist, two lawyers who have at least served as Regional Trial Court judges, a social worker, and two representatives from nongovernment organizations (NGOs) engaged in child-care and child placing activities.

Among the primary functions of the NACC will be to declare a child legally available for adoption. It will also handle matters concerning domestic administrative adoptions and adult adoption.

Until the NACC is established, its functions in issuing a Certificate Declaring a Child Legally Available for Adoption (CDCLAA) will temporarily remain with the DSWD's Program Management Bureau.

R.A. No. 11767 – An Act Promoting the Rights of and Providing Greater Protections to Deserted or Abandoned Children with Unknown Parents, Amending for this Purpose Articles 276 and 277 of the Revised Penal Code and Special Laws, Recognizing their Status as Natural-Born Citizens of the Philippines, Providing Penalties Against Acts Inimical to their Welfare, and for Other Purposes (S. No. 2223/H. No. 7679) [May 6, 2022]

Under this law, an abandoned child found in the Philippines or in Philippine embassies, consulates, and territories abroad is presumed a natural-born Filipino citizen, regardless of the status or circumstances of birth.

As a natural-born citizen of the Philippines, a foundling is accorded with rights and protections at the moment of birth equivalent to those belonging to such class of citizens whose citizenship does not need perfection or any further act. The presumption of natural-born status of a foundling may not be questioned in any proceeding unless substantial proof of foreign parentage is shown.

The foundling shall be declared legally available for adoption, when the biological parents cannot be identified and located, subject to existing laws, rules and regulations and taking into consideration the best interest of the child. Once the adoption is finalized, the adopted foundling shall be considered the legitimate child of the adopter for all intents and purposes. Thus, they are entitled to the rights and obligations provided by law to legitimate children.

Local government units, in coordination with the Philippine Statistics Authority, NACC, and other relevant stakeholders, shall conduct regular and synchronized data collection, to develop and implement more responsive policies, plans and programs for foundlings. All benefits provided in this Act shall also apply to foundlings duly registered during their childhood but have reached the age of maturity.

S. No. 1411 – An Act Amending Republic Act No. 8972 Otherwise Known as An Act Providing for Benefits and Privileges to Solo Parents and their Children, Appropriating Funds therefor and For Other Purposes

This bill provides a package of social protections for solo parents and their children, which includes livelihood development services, counselling services, and the provision of legal advice

and assistance, among others. This bill also expands the classification of being a solo parent to include: (1) widowed parents; and (2) spouses of OFWs in the low or semi-skilled worker category who had been away from the Philippines for an unbroken period of 12 months.

Under the proposed measure, solo parents are also qualified for a seven-day paid parental leave from their places of employment, whether public or private, and regardless of their employment status. One of a solo parent's biggest concerns, especially if they have young children, is childcare. S.B 1411, therefore, calls for government agencies and offices with more than 300 employees and private companies with 200 or more employees to establish in-house day care centers to accommodate the children of their employees aged five and below.

The bill also proposes a list of benefits for solo parents and their children. In addition, it also provides support for solo parents who are abused, abandoned, or neglected by their spouses. As such, the bill grants the neglected spouse the right to retain a portion of their spouse's income, as agreed by both parents or by the court, for the support of the child.

S. No. 2209 – An Act Strengthening Protections Against Online Sexual Abuse and Exploitation of Children, Amending for this Purpose Republic Act No. 9775 or The Anti-Child Pornography Act Of 2009, Amending for this Purpose Republic Act No. 9995, or The Anti-Photo and Video Voyeurism Act of 2009, Providing Penalties for its Violations, and for Other Purposes

The proposed Special Protections against Online Sexual Abuse and Exploitation of Children (OSAEC) Law provides special protection to children from all forms of sexual violence, abuse and exploitation especially those committed with the use of information and communications technology.

The measure stipulates sanctions for violators, as well as identifies programs for the prevention, deterrence, and intervention that will help prevent online sexual abuse and exploitation of children.

The “Online Sexual Abuse and Exploitation of Children (OSAEC)” referred in this bill is the use of digital or analog communication, as a means to abuse and exploit children sexually. This includes: the production, dissemination, and possession of Child Sexual Abuse and Exploitation Materials (CSAEM); online grooming of children for sexual purposes; sexual extortion of children, sharing image-based sexual abuse; commercial sexual exploitation of children; exploitation of children through online prostitution; and live-streaming of sexual abuse, with or without the consent of the victim.

The offenses under this bill are considered as public crimes. Therefore, any person who has personal knowledge of the commission of these crimes, such as the victim-survivor, the parents, spouse, siblings, legal guardian, officer, or social worker or representative of a licensed child-caring institution, officer or social worker of the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD), Philippine National Police (PNP) and National Bureau of Investigation (NBI) officers, barangay chairperson, and, at least three (3) concerned citizens where the violation occurred, may file a complaint against the offender.

The creation of the OSAEC Offenders Registry is also required under the proposal. The registry shall contain the list of adult individuals, Filipino nationals and foreigners, with their personal information, who were convicted of OSAEC and other sexual offenses against children.

S. No. 2399 – An Act Mandating the Establishment and Implementation of the Parent Effectiveness Service Program to Strengthen Parental Involvement in their

Children’s Development and Learning and Appropriating Funds Therefor

The bill provides for the establishment of a Parent Effectiveness Service (PES) Program in every city and municipality to assist parents and parents substitutes in strengthening their knowledge and skills in their parental duties and responsibilities, protect and promote children’s rights, foster positive early childhood development, and advance their educational progress.

The Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) shall be the primary agency responsible for the implementation of the PES program and shall develop modules in coordination with the Department of Education (DepEd), the Early Childhood Care and Development (ECCD) Council, the School Governing Councils (SGCs), the Department of Health (DOH), Department of Justice (DOJ), and the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG).

S. No. 2449 – An Act Strengthening Protections Against Trafficking in Persons, Amending for this Purpose Republic Act No. 9208, as Amended by Republic Act No. 10364, Entitled ‘An Act to Institute Policies to Eliminate Trafficking in Persons Especially Women and/or Children, Establishing the Necessary Institutional Mechanisms for the Protection and Support of Trafficked Persons’, and Other Special Laws and for Other Purposes

The bill aims to strengthen RA 9208, as amended by Republic Act No. 10364, by providing standards and guidelines on surveillance, interception, investigations, and prosecution of different forms of human trafficking, including sexual exploitation, prostitution, forced labor, slavery, and removal or sale of organs, among others.

Violation of Section 9 of the bill, which enumerates the duties and responsibilities of the private sector, shall have a fine of not less than P2 million but not more than P5 million for the first offense. Subsequent offense shall have the penalty of a fine of not less than P2 million but not more than P10 million and revocation of franchise and license to operate.

While the penalty of imprisonment of six (6) years and a fine of not less than P500,000. but not more than P1 million shall be charged for any attempt to unduly pressure the complainant to execute an Affidavit of Desistance.

S. No. 2504 – An Act Designating the National Music Competitions or Young Artists (NAMCYA) as the National Youth Development Program for Music, Defining its Role and Functions as Such, and Appropriating Funds Therefor

The bill seeks to institutionalize the National Competitions for Young Artists (NAMCYA) by designating it as the Philippine National Youth Development Program.

A NAMCYA Special Committee is formed to carry out the objectives of this proposed law. This Committee shall be composed of the following: Chairperson of the National Commission on Culture and Arts (NCCA) as Chairperson; Secretaries of the Department of Education (DepEd); Department of Tourism (DOT); Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG); Department of Information and Communications Technology (DICT); Director of the Philippine Information Agency (PIA); President of the Cultural Center of the Philippines (CCP); Chairperson and Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of the National Youth Commission (NYC); and the President of the NAMCYA Foundation.

Initial funding for the implementation of this proposal shall be sourced from the current appropriations of NCCA.

Continuous implementation shall be lodged in the Annual General Appropriations Act.

H. No. 9852 – An Act Institutionalizing the Conduct of Summer Youth Camp in Every Barangay and Appropriating Funds Therefor

The bill mandates the Sangguniang Kabataan (SK) to hold summer youth camps in every barangay. It also directs the SK to plan, implement, monitor and evaluate the summer youth camps in their respective jurisdictions.

The SK, National Youth Commission, representatives from the local educational institutions, and the Local Development Youth Office shall develop course modules on leadership seminar, writing workshop, public speaking, sports and fitness, mental wellness, digital skills, entrepreneurship, livelihood and cultural awareness for the youth. This aims to inculcate a sense of social responsibility, ingrain patriotism in the consciousness of the youth, develop youth leadership, engage them in livelihood and entrepreneurship activities, and promote their active participation in sports.

The budget for the Summer Youth Camp shall be included in the annual appropriations of the SK.

ADDENDUM

RA 11635 – An Act Amending Section 27(B) of the National Internal Revenue Code of 1997, As Amended, and for Other Purposes

This law was approved by President Rodrigo R. Duterte last December 10, 2021. It amends Section 27 (B) of the National Internal Revenue Code of 1997 which is on the tax treatment of proprietary educational institutions or private schools and non-profit hospitals.

It specifically provides that, *“Hospitals which are nonprofit and proprietary educational institutions shall pay a tax of ten percent (10%) on their taxable income except those covered by Subsection (D) hereof: Provided, That beginning July 1, 2020 until June 30, 2023, the tax rate herein imposed shall be one percent (1%): Provided, further, That if the gross income from unrelated trade, business or other activity exceeds fifty percent (50%) of the total gross income derived by such educational institutions or hospitals from all sources, the tax prescribed in Subsection (A) hereof shall be imposed on the entire taxable income.”*

This law essentially corrects and clarifies the BIR issuance subsequently released when Republic Act No. 11534 or the Corporate Recovery and Tax Incentives for Enterprises (CREATE) Law was passed on March 26, 2021 where private schools ended up being imposed with the regular income tax rate of 25%.

The Department of Finance has been tasked under the law to promulgate the necessary rules and regulations for its effective implementation.
